In 2006 Mrs. Smith-King served as President of the Gary Centennial Celebration which resulted in over \$800,000 being raised and the installation of "Fusion" at Genesis Center Plaza. Mrs. Smith-King currently serves on the board of South Shore Arts, Friends of Emerson, and South Shore Center for the Arts. In addition she is co-chair of Arts & Letters Committee for the Gary Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc and committee member of the New Day Transition Task Force: Arts & Culture Committee for Democratic Mayor Nominee Karen Freeman Wilson.
